Small Vessel Compliance Program (SVCP)

Goal is to improve safety practices in the small nonpleasure vessel community (workboats, passenger, fishing and tugs) through:

- Educating vessel owners and operators about their regulatory obligations under the Canada Shipping Act 2001, according to their type of vessel
- Making available accessible and user-friendly checklist style tools to help vessel owners and operators verify their vessels are in compliance
- Establishing a framework to help strengthen Marine Safety and Security's oversight regime



SVCP Targets Small Vessels

- Vessels of not more than 15 gross tonnage (GT), with 12 or less passengers, that are **not** subject to mandatory inspection under the Vessel Safety Certificate Regulations
- 28,000 small commercial vessels in Vessel Registry
- Three distinct components
 - SVCP: small passenger vessels and workboats SCCP – F: small fishing vessels
 - SVCP T: small tugs



What is included in SVCP?

SVCP consist of all inclusive package tailored to the vessel type to assist small vessel operators with compliance with regulations.

- Detailed Compliance Report itemized checklist
- Compliance Report Guidelines provides detailed guidance (and best practices) to address vessel owners and operators' legal obligations regarding vessel and crew safety and addresses key safety issues.
- Annual Compliance Report simplified checklist
- Letter of Participation, and Decal



SVCP (blue), SVCP-F (orange) & SVCP-T decals (green)

SVCP Milestones

- 2011 SVCP created for small passenger vessels and workboats (paper-based)
- 2014 SVCP web application for online enrollments launched
- 2018 SVCP-F for fishing vessels added to the program
- 2021 SVCP-F added to the online web application program and
- 2022 SVCP-T for tugs added with both paper and online enrollment

SVCP Benefits

- No cost to owner/operator
- Owners and operators better understand their obligations and know what requirements they must meet to be in compliance with regulations
- Demonstrated commitment to safety good for business
 - Help meet the conditions in some provinces or municipalities to obtain a commercial business permit
 - Some organisations are requiring the decal prior to accepting contracts from vessel owners
- Vessel owners and operators are well prepared to meet future Safety Management System requirements
- As program enrollments grow:
 - SVCP is "Gold standard" in safety practices and related compliance becomes normative
 - Safety culture moves from individual vessel owners and extends to industry-wide adoption of strengthened safety culture
 - TC inspector resources can focus on those higher-risk (not enrolled) vessels.
- Enhanced safety for crew and vessel = reduction in risk for accidents and related costs



SVCP Challenges

- Not all registered vessel owners are aware of SVCP; some targeted vessels are not registered
- No legal obligation to enroll in the SVCP
- Vessel owners/operators may not understand how the program can help enhance their safety practices
- Some vessel owners may view safety as an extra cost burden
- Original paper-based enrollment process very cumbersome
- Original Web application was not very user friendly
- Uptake about 20% of small vessels enrolled since program launched in 2011



SVCP Lessons learned

Program Accessibility

- User friendly materials; plain language
- Integrate best practices from industry
- Web application upgraded to improve process for enrollment program for Fishing vessels and Tugs
- Still need to retain paper-based for some

Program Awareness

- Clearly communicate key benefits of enrollment
- Direct outreach i.e. Mass direct email and mail outreach promoting SVCP to applicable vessel types with regional contact for follow-up
- integrate Social Media platforms teams to promote program
- Leveraging existing Programs and Partnerships
 - "Post Cards" promoting SVCP sent with Vessel Registrations
 - Opportunity for CBMU



Opportunities for CBMU Members

- Transport Canada believes the SVCP program help reduce marine accidents and associated costs by elevating the safety culture in these small vessel operations.
- The objective is to increase enrollments to a greater proportion of the small vessel fleet.
- We invite CBMU members to join us in addressing this objective.
 - CBMU could confirm vessel registration with Transport Canada
 - CBMU could encourage its members to promote benefits of SVCP enrollment to vessel owners seeking insurance coverage or renewing their insurance policies.
 - CBMU could help to incentivize SVCP participation by promoting a policy of considering SVCP participation in their risk evaluation and potential reduced insurance premiums for enrolled vessels.
- Greater participation in SVCP translate into a reduced safety risk
